

What is EDGE?

Academic Certificate Program – *Experiential Education Certificate*

- Strong focus on employability skills and career readiness
- Undergraduate students in regular stream (non-co-op)
- Opt-in

- Designed to help students identify the skills that they are developing in and out of the classroom and ultimately express those skills to target audiences



Career Development Course


In this course students will develop core career-seeking skills by:


- Résumé writing



EDGE Course Eligibility

- Course must be weighted for academic achievement (0.25 credits or higher)
- Course must be open to regular (non-coop students)
- Course must engage a third party (community or industry partner)
- Third party must be connected enough to students that they are able to comment on an evaluation of their workplace performance (18 hours)
- Third party must complete evaluation for students



EDGE Approved Courses

Course Code	Component Description
PSYCH 465	Apprenticeship – student immersed in workplace for 60 hours over the course of the term
ENBUS 402	Students matched with organizations in teams. Students work on project that integrates and applies the concept of business and sustainability
HLTH 481	Student placed in service learning related placement for 8-10 hours per week with a community agency



One Off Course Approvals

- Process internally by which courses with student-driven or fluctuating components can be approved on a one-off basis
 - Examples: Special Topics Courses; Consulting projects



DEFINITION OF WIL

Work-Integrated Learning (WIL)

 "Work-integrated learning is a model and process of curricular experiential education which formally and intentionally integrates a student's academic studies within a workplace or practice setting. WIL experiences include an engaged partnership of at least: an academic institution, a host organization and a student. WIL can occur at the course or program level and includes the development of learning outcomes related to employability, personal agency and life-long learning"


How Can You Support EDGE?
