Text: Social Psychology Alive! (1<sup>st</sup> Canadian Edition).

Course Overview: The purpose of this course is to introduce you to research within the field of social psychology. Topics include: prejudice, stereotyping, attraction, attitudes, the self, self-esteem, prosocial behavior, persuasion, and others. The textbook is broad and general, while the lectures will tend to cover more specific issues, especially recent experimental and theoretical approaches.

Requirements: There will be three in-class tests, and NO final exam. Each test will cover all material from the text, videos, and lectures from the period following the previous test (or, in the case of Test 1, the first class). Tests are not cumulative. They will be multiple-choice. The first test is on January 30<sup>th</sup>, and is worth 30%. The second test is on March 18<sup>th</sup> and is worth 45%. The third test is on April 7<sup>th</sup> and is worth 25%.

Bonus marks: See ACE re: bonus experimental credits.

- 1) **ACE**: Please check ACE regularly. We will post announcements, grades, lecture notes etc.
- 2) **Attendance**: To succeed, attend all lectures. Tests will be approximately 50% lecture material, and I will present a great deal of material not covered in your textbook and expand on important points in the text.
