#### **Course Description**:

The field of learning disabilities is multi-faceted, ranging from theoretical and philosophical debates as to the nature of learning disabilities to more practical issues such as assessment of learning disabilities and interventions to ameliorate learning difficulties. This course will discuss a variety of theoretical, research, assessment, and intervention issues important to understanding and treating learning disabilities.

#### **Course Objectives:**

- Understand and critically evaluate conceptualizations of learning disabilities
- Understand learning disabilities across the life span
- Understand theories and treatment of reading, writing, and math disabilities
- Understand, explain, and critically evaluate best practices in assessment and remediation/treatment of learning disabilities
