variety of schools of architecture in North America, Europe, Asia and Australia. He is a principal and founder of the Toronto based architectural practice MJ Architecture, whose portfolio includes building and public space design, exhibitions and art installations. He has published widely in journals on contemporary Canadian architecture, and has written books on the cultural dimensions of contemporary sustainable architecture, 41° to 66°: Regional Responses to Sustainable Architecture in Canada, (co-author with Marco Polo) and on Canada's leading engineering practice, Yolles: A Canadian Engineering Legacy, (co-author with Beth Kapusta). He was recipient of the Canada Council Prix de Rome in Architecture and the exhibition, (co-authored with Marco Polo), 41° to 66°: Region, Culture, Tectonics, represented Canada at the Venice Biennale for Architecture in 2008.

Grace Kim is an award-winning architect and co-founder of Schemata Workshop - a full services architectural firm located in Seattle, WA.

Her projects focus on building community, social equity, and sustainability.

Grace is also a co-founder of a 9-household cohousing community - that was self-developed as a limited equity, rental model. The 5-story building occupies a 4500sf lot in a very urban neighborhood called Capitol Hill.

Grace serves on the Seattle Planning Commission and is on the Board of Directors for the Housing Development Consortium – a regional advocacy organization for the affordable housing industry.

Grace often speaks on panels about cohousing and affordability and is leading the cohousing movement in North America.

Tune in while Grace demonstrates how the cohousing model is key to creating resilient, caring, communities.

Adrian Blackwell is an artist and urban designer, who teaches architecture at the University of Waterloo. His artwork focuses on the antagonisms and inequalities of existing public and urban spaces. Influenced by anarchist political

philosophy, he creates physical spaces of equality and communication. Since 1998, he has been making a sequence of evolving works titled Model for a Public Space, which have shown at artist run centers and galleries across Canada and in the US. The latest of these are Scaffold and Horizons (Earth and Sky) for the opening year of Toronto's Museum of Contemporary Art and Isonomia in Toronto? for the 2019 Toronto Biennial of Art. Blackwell exhibited at the 2005 Shenzhen and 2011 Chengdu Biennials and Mirror circles for Ba Jin was installed in the 2015 Shanghai Urban Space Art Season. At the 2019 Chicago Architecture Biennial, he made an Anarchitectural Library (against the erasure of the Chicago's common spaces), bringing together publications curated by twenty activist organizations working to preserve the city's common spaces.
