On the Interactional Import of Self-Repair in the Courtroom Tanya Romaniuk and Susan Ehrlich (York University) Friday, November 25, 2 pm in ML 245

How are certain conversational resources used for specific purposes in institutional talk? This talk examines how repair, a resource commonly used in any interaction, is employed in the courtroom in the service of institutionally-specific tasks and constraints.

<u>Susan Ehrlich</u> is a Professor, Linguistics and Women's Studies and has published in the areas of discourse analysis, language and gender, linguistic approaches to literature and second language acquisition. Her recent books include Representing Rape: Language and Sexual Consent (Routledge 2001).

<u>Tanya Romaniuk</u> is a PhD student in Applied Linguistics with research interests in sociocultural linguistics, discourse analysis, conversation analysis, language and gender, institutional talk, broadcast talk, and political communication. She is currently writing her dissertation on the interactional analysis of laughter in broadcast news interviews.
