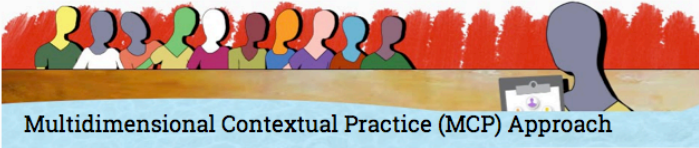

MCP is shaped by a number of theoretical concepts from social science and the theological discussion of contextual ethics (Guadalupe & Lum, 2005).

In particular, the following theoretical concepts form the foundation of MCP:

- Multidimensionality
- Multiple identities/experiences
- Critical consciousness
- Intersectionality
- Positionality
- Contextualization
