Course Description:

This course provides an introduction to microeconomic analysis relevant for understanding the Canadian economy. The behaviour of individual consumers and producers, the determination of market prices for commodities and resources, and the role of government policy in the functioning of the market system are the main topics covered.

Course Objectives:

- To analyze the use of the price system to allocate limited resources in an economy, i.e. supply, demand, elasticity, and their applications.
- To understand how people (producers and consumers) make rational decisions.
- To familiarize students with different market structures, production and costs.
- To understand some of the relevant economic policies.
