Welcome to ECON 306. This course serves as an introduction to the theory and practice of macroeconomics at the undergraduate level. Emphasis is on the microeconomic foundations of macroeconomics. Topics include, among others, dynamic general equilibrium analysis, household choice of consumption demand, business cycles, economic growth, and government budget. Knowledge of calculus, linear algebra, and statistics are required. To enhance the learning experience, students are strongly encouraged to attend all lectures, take notes, read and analyze journal and magazine articles, and participate in class discussion.
