Course description

The goal of this course is to understand the enormous differences in living standards across countries and over time. It uses economic analysis to understand the sources of investment and innovation, and the role of economic, social, and political institutions in economic growth and development.

Textbook

Evaluation

Student performance will be evaluated through a collection of assignments, a midterm exam and a take-home exam, with the following weights:

Assignments: 35% Midterm exam: 40% Take-home exam: 25%

Students are expected to work in groups (about 3-5 students per group) on all assignments. The first midterm exam will be held on October 29 and it will take place in the class period and the room classes are held. The take-home exam is due in class on December 3.
