It uses economic models to understand and analyze the role of factor accumulation, technology, institutions, culture, and international aid, among others, in fostering productivity and economic growth. The prerequisite of this course is ECON 306. Also, a working knowledge of calculus, linear algebra, probability, and statistics is required.
