## **Course Description**

This is an advanced course in macroeconomics for undergraduate students. The objective of the course is to provide the foundations of a theoretical framework that is useful to understand the distribution of earnings. The Fall 2021 iteration of Econ 409 emphasizes the role of skills and technology, the gig economy and the Covid-19 crisis.

## Discipline
