


BUILDING A BRAG BOOK

A brag book is a professional portfolio that showcases an individual's achievements, skills, and experiences.

- It is often used in job interviews to provide tangible evidence of past successes and competencies.
- Brag books can include a variety of materials such as certificates, awards, letters of recommendation, positive performance reviews, and project summaries.
- The purpose of a brag book is to demonstrate your value and suitability for a position by highlighting real-world examples of their work and accomplishments.

Biggest tip: It's a LIVING document

• I recommend to my staff that they keep a document/file on their desktop (i.e. jot things down daily which helps with our biannual performance assessments)




BRAG BOOKS DIFFER FROM CVS

Aspect	CV	Brag Book
Overview	Concise overview of work history, education, and skills	Detailed and often visual representation of achievements
Length	1 to 2 pages	Comprehensive portfolio
Format	Standardized format listing positions, responsibilities, and accomplishments	Includes tangible evidence like certificates, awards, letters of recommendation, and positive performance reviews
Visual Elements	None	Graphs, charts, photos
Customization	Static document tailored slightly for each job application	Highly customizable, arranged to align with specific roles
Layout	Simple	Professional layout, includes table of contents
Usage	Static document	Dynamic presentation tool during interviews
Complement	Standalone	Complements a CV by providing a richer narrative

YOU'VE GOT THIS

EXAMPLES FROM MYOWN EXPERIENCE

- Invention of the Rootsmart[™] Tree Propagation Tray
 - Hold patents in Canada, the United States, Australia
 - Filed patents in New Zealand and the European Union
 - A CV would capture the patents but not the IMPACT of the invention:
 - Promotes Healthy Root Development
 - Prevents root defects during propagation
 - Reduces tree failure in urban landscapes
 - Videos and marketing materials etc.
- Establishing Pathways Between Municipalities and Tree Suppliers
 - Ensuring seamless flow of trees
 - Meeting changing market demands
 - Filled a gap in the supply chain that was previously unrecognized

- State-of-the-Art Outdoor Research Facility "TreeCulture Research Park"
 - Unique in North America
 - Designed for urban green infrastructure
 - Supports soil health analysis
- Indoor Soils and Substrates Laboratory



- Say yes to experiences! Participate in internships, volunteer work, and job opportunities to build your skill set.
- Set Goals: Establish clear, achievable milestones for your career journey.
- Stay Informed: Keep up with industry trends and continue developing your expertise.
- Embrace Challenges: Use obstacles as opportunities for growth and learning.
