# School of Planning Report to Faculty of Environment Council/AGM

#### Overview:

It's been a very good year for the School of Planning. Members of the School continue to be highly productive in scholarly research as well as more applied work with community groups, governments, and the private sector. The School has delivered courses and supervision to more than 670 undergraduate students and 170 graduate students within our own unit, and many more across the University and broader academic community. Our projected Fall 2025 undergraduate and graduate program enrolment numbers look very positive.

Over the past year, members of the School have focused attention on launching our revised undergraduate program, began a comprehensive review of our Master's programs, and refined various administrative processes to enhance efficiency and effectiveness. Outward efforts include knowledge dissemination, professional development opportunities for the profession, media engagement, and working with governments and international and national advisory bodies.

Our faculty have frequently engaged with the community on high-profile issues such as planning for climate change, affordable housing, climate-friendly urban development, planning with Indigenous communities, and social equity in planning. We continue to work diligently on identifying and carrying out action items around equity, diversity, inclusion, and justice in line with the School's statement of values.

Moving forward, the School will support and help to advance the Faculty's very promising "Environment in 2035" initiative, the university's dynamic "Waterloo at 100" strategic plan, and the Future Cities Institute (FCI). In the spirit of internationalization, the School is now a member of the Association of European Schools of Planning (AESOP), and our faculty are active with international agencies such as UN-Habitat and the Commonwealth Association of Planners. With this context in mind, we will continue to build and expand our connections to the Planning practice community, and contribute to the advancement of Planning education, research, and practice in Canada and overseas.

#### Planner-in-Residence:

Each year, the School of Planning hosts a Planner-in-Residence, an expert who teaches and conducts seminars. The program gives students and faculty the opportunity to interact with professionals who are leaders in their field. The Planner-in-Residence program is funded by the University of Waterloo Planning Alumni of Toronto.

For the 2024-2025 academic year, the Planner-in-Residence was Jason Thorne, the incoming Chief Planner for the City of Toronto. He delivered PLAN 403 in the winter term to our 4th year undergraduate students and interacted with the School community in various other ways throughout the year. Jason is a Registered Professional Planner with the Ontario Professional Planners Institute, and he is a Full Member of the Canadian Institute of Planners.

### **Graduate Programs**

In September 2024, the School of Planning welcomed 7 new PhD students (5FT and 2PT) and 19 MA/MES (Planning) students. This brings the total number of students in our research programs to 9 students. We also welcomed 6 students to our online MPlan/GDip program, which is oriented towards working planning professionals. After Fall 2024, admissions to the MPLAN/Gdip programs were paused as we undertake a comprehensive review of the programs. This brings the total number of students in that program to 35.

### **Undergraduate Program:**

In 2024, the School celebrated 117 undergraduate students' graduation with their BES in Planning. Last September, the School welcomed 182 first-year students!

Some noteworthy undergraduate accomplishments:

- The long-standing tradition of a student conference (Waterloo Toronto Metropolitan University Planning Conference, or WTMUPC) with the Toronto Metropolitan's Association of Planning Students (TMAPS) and the University of Waterloo's Planning Students' Association (PSA) took place in April 2024 and March 2025. This annual event continues to build bridges, providing opportunities to exchange ideas and mutual learning.
- A group of Planning students was among a delegation that visited Cape Town, South Africa in the Spring 2024 term to gain international perspectives on environmental issues.

One distinguishing feature of the School of Planning is our vibrant and vital connection with the practice world of professional planning; and special events are an essential contributor to the success of that connection.

#### **Research Activities:**

Faculty and student colleagues in the School continue to design, carry out, and communicate research that addresses the major issues of the day at multiple scales – the "wicked problems" of our time. Our work is inter- and trans-disciplinary, and collaborative in nature. Our researchers work with colleagues in the Faculty, across the campus, and elsewhere (including the practice/policy world). We address issues such as (among many others) the causes and impacts of the climate crisis, future cities, the vexing food insecurity challenge, ecosystem governance, the development of geo-referenced decision-making models, prioritizing social equity, planning in/with complexity, affordable housing, and planning with Canada's Indigenous Peoples.

We pride ourselves on conducting research that is solution-oriented and that informs planning practice. Our work is published in top-ranked scholarly and practice-oriented journals. School scholars continue to perform well in Tri-Council, other domestic research funding programs and in international research funding initiatives, and they influence decision-making through high-profile media contributions

**Some examples:** The School of Planning's Dr. Brian Doucet has conducted extensive research on various aspects of the urban housing challenge. Brian is also committed to creating readily accessible research outputs. His newest project is a feature-length video — "Thinking Beyond the Market: A Film about Genuinely Affordable Housing" - which explores the nature of the affordable housing challenge in communities across Canada.

In Parker and Huang (2025), Dr. Dawn Parker and colleague Dr. Y. Huang demonstrate that bike lanes don't reduce property value - in fact, they increase values for condo housing. They also show that tree canopy and street trees add value for both single-family housing and condos. Takeaway: everyone wants and needs green around their housing!

In his paper, PhD (Planning) Candidate Alex Petric et al. (2025) demonstrates that equity-challenged groups and single-parent households are more likely to be unsuitably housed, having insufficient space for their family size. It also shows that while new construction is occurring, it's not taking place where these unsuitably housed households live currently. These findings hold both inside and outside the light rail corridor in the Waterloo region context.
