# Collection development policy statement for the Political Science Department

June 2021

#### Persons responsible for collection

The decision to select library materials is the responsibility of the Liaison Librarian, Jane Forgay, in consultation with the Faculty Library Representative, Jingjing Huo.

#### **Department activities**

Research and teaching activities of the department focus on:

- Canadian Politics
- Global Politics
- Politics & Business
- Public Policy & Administration

Degrees are offered at the undergraduate and master's levels, with the doctoral program beginning Fall 2022. Many of the department's faculty participate in the University of Waterloo's Master of Public Service and the Balsillie School of International Affairs' Master and PhD programs in Global Governance.

#### **Scope of coverage**

Materials are collected which support the teaching and research that fall within the areas described above. A limited number of works that provide foundational and complementary coverage regarding the broad field of political science and its research methodologies are also collected. Materials outside these areas may also be acquired when related research or teaching is being conducted by individual faculty members. A more detailed subject break-down is provided in the section: Subjects / themes and collecting levels.

# Indigenous peoples, racialized people, and other underrepresented voices

The Librarian will actively seek out and acquire works of Indigenous peoples, racialized people, and the works of other underrepresented voices when they fit with the department's research and teaching focuses.

#### Languages

English language materials are preferred but materials in other languages are collected if appropriate.

#### **Geographical areas**

All geographical areas that are relevant to the department will be collected.

#### **Chronological periods**

Focus is given primarily to the 20<sup>th</sup> and 21<sup>st</sup> centuries. Stronger emphasis is placed on the post-World War II period.

#### Types and formats of materials collected

Any type of material will be considered if it is relevant to the teaching and research in the areas listed above and as the Political Science fund permits. Types of greatest importance are monographs and serials. Relevant bibliographies, biographies, chronologies, and research databases (indexes/abstracts) are also collected. Both print and electronic/digital formats are considered but when possible, duplication of content is avoided.

Materials generally excluded but may instead be acquired with other library funds or by the campus Media Resources Library are government documents, data sets, streaming video, and films in formats such as DVDs. The Library does not normally acquire textbooks.

All collections are systematically reviewed for currency of information and to ensure that essential and important resources are retained. Superseded editions and titles containing outdated information are withdrawn as necessary. Classic retrospective materials are retained and preserved to serve the needs of foundational and historical study.

In acquiring new digital content, preference will be given to formats that are open and accessible whenever possible.

The Library explores opportunities for collaborative purchases with the Ontario Council of University Libraries and the Canadian Research Knowledge Network.

## **Appendix**

#### **Explanation of levels of collecting**

#### Out of scope

Materials to support research and curricula in this subject area are not covered in this Collection Policy Statement. Coverage of interdisciplinary subject areas and topics linked across departments can be identified with references to other Collection Policy Statements.

#### **Basic information/reference level**

The collection serves to introduce and define the subject. Only the most important reference works, general surveys, the most significant works of major authors, and a limited selection of representative general periodicals are collected. This level of collecting can be abbreviated as Basic/reference in the collection policies

#### Instructional support level (Undergraduate)

The collection supports all courses of undergraduate study. Materials collected include a wide range of reference works, fundamental bibliographic tools, and an extensive collection of monographs and periodicals. Access to owned or remotely-accessed electronic resources, including texts, journals, data sets, etc. is provided.

#### Research level

The collection includes major published source materials required for master's degree programmes, doctoral study and independent research in the subject. All formats, including appropriate foreign-language titles, are acquired. Historically important monographs, archival materials, and back-runs of serials are acquired as necessary.
