Bishops and Brethren: - Greeting.

Owing to the fact that a number of the Exemption Tribunals have not been giving recognition to the claims of our brethren for exemption on the grounds that they are excluded from the operation of the Military Service at Act, and since their ruling have not been uniform it is advisable that every claim that has not been honored with entire exemption should be at once appealed to a higher tribunal. Where exemption has been granted conditionally for other than conscientious reasons the claim should also be apply pealed to accord with the regulations that Mennonites are excluded from the Act, and hence not subject to the sonditions prescribed by the Local Tribunals.

The Military Service Council at Ottawa has specially considered the position of the Mennonites in Ontario and threfore we have a right to claim our privileges of entire freedom from the Military Service Act under the ruling which they have given. Their decision was made upon the appelas of Mennonites in Ontario, and our claims may be made accordingly.

Each Bishop and each minister who has charge of a congregation in wicht there are brethren who have claimed exemption should see that these claims are made for all who are effected by decisions of the Local Trubunals.

Praying for our young brethren and for our authorities that we may have our peace and righteousness secured to us, I am,

If any of our young brethren are not entirely exempted on account of their belonging to the Mennonite Church they should appeal at once to the next higher Tribunal. In case that Tribunal refuses to dismiss them from service there is nother Tribunal to which they may appeal. I do not think that it would be wise at present to trouble the Department of Justice at Ottawa with this matter until we have had all the cases appealed to the higher Tribunals. In case they do not allow any of these applications to Mennonites then it will be time to take the matter up wity Ottawa.
