am not in a position to give you any definite information regarding the matter of the exemption of the adherents of the Mennonite Church. That subject has been prought before the Government through our Correspondence a number of times, and also in the presence of the Coernment by our Committees. But there has been no statuent made concerning them. I feel that the law is very explicit on the point of exemptions at the present time. The Tunker prethren who are fully as nonrecistant in their printples of faith as ourselves, have no exemption because their names are not mentioned in theorem in Council and not in the Act. The Cofernment has been governed by the detter of the law. Since the purpose of the Act was to grant exemption to those who aere memors of religious bodies, there seems to be out little hope for the adherents. There is difficulty in getting recognition for even the actual memors.

Brother Reeser has called me over the phine and asked concerning this same natter. I told him that I had no information. He stated that he would likely go to Waterloo the first of the week. You will very probably meet him then. For the information of both, I can refer you only to our appeal for the sons of our memors who are not of age. We were disenfranchised by the Elections Act, and under that act, the minor ons were exempted from Military service. If that Act is still in force, the Minor ons are yet eligible to exempton. But the exempton of all classes was included in the new Order in Guncil, and the exempton of these ons having been mentioned in the Act, their exemption may be onsidered cancelled under the orde. But we should make every effort to secure their exemption since they are beeny brought up under these distinct principles of faith and it is their honest conviction and should be honored.

Since Brother ad yourself have taken up this matter with the doverment with one degree of success, I believe that it ould be best for you to continue your effects from the point that you are agreed it and through the successity which you are in touch and three is every probability that you will have greater success than if it is taken up in some new effort. However, it will be our pleasure to ontinue with you to being this matter to a right conduction. It is said that any one bould be fooded to war. But if there is anothing that may be done I am ready to co-operate in it. We should pray that we may have peace for ourselves for the sake of the faith of Christ. We should pay for the relief of all others, especially for the one of those we have onsecrated them to the Lord from their birth.

Will let you know at once of any further word from the dovernat.

Dear Brother: - Greeting to you and yours in the name of the Blessed Maste, Whom we serve and Whose grace is ready for our every need.

Tour letters received and noted. I m very erry that we have a further information to give than that which was sent on the instruction regrding the exemptions that were being granted by the Ontwrio Registrar at Toront. A number of the Tunker brethren are being called and have not been recognized on account of their faith. The Government says that they are not exempted. I believe that we own our present exemption only to the Provisions that were meant for the Russian Brethren, and exemption is granted us on account of the f-act that the name Mennonite is bund in the Act.

We have written to the Government concerning the standing of bosewho are Minors, and whose parents have been disenfranchised under the Elections Act. To this question we have received no further instructions. We can give no advice in this matter at present. If there are any of the boys who have been or are members of the Church who ave not applied for exempt on on onscientious grounds or meders of the Chack. If they are now members, let them make their claims now as mebers, and equal exempton will be granted them if the Church on sapply them with certificates of membership. If they are conscientiously opposed to combatant service and have no choice other than to camply with the call, this is, if they are not mebers, but soms of mebers of our church, let them state their conscientous go unds regarding combatant service and ask for non-combatat service. Rhis is the best they can do. We must wait for further decisions from the Government conce ming the sons of Mennonite parets. We can mke del nite claims only for those who are actual members of the Church, for tht is the provision which the law has made for us. Undedtand that it maks no difference if these boys have become members a nee the the Act is in force, they ave a right to claim the exemption. We do not encourage or children to enter the Church in order to be exempt for military servic. We want them to know that they are saved by their faith in Christ, and to know that they possess that salvaton themseves, and knownser consecrated themselves to the Lord for His service and to live obeddent to His Word.

I hope that we my soon know where we stand and that the Operment will exercise tolerance toward those who believe in the peace and lee of God and Christ to men, and to kose who have been brought up under those instruction

We will send any further instruction to all ofour ministers, and will be glad to do'o.

Most Excelent Brother. greeting, in the name of Him whosais, "I will never leave you, or forsake you".

Just a few words to inform you what we met with on our arrival at Hamilton Baracks. Just before arriving at the Baracks, we were fortunate in meeting Bro G Bearss, from Stevensville who had accompanied a young Bro Winger, who also reported the day previous as required by notice. We learned from him Bro Winger had accepted the two weeks leave, and it at once struck us that if all our young Breathered would take this course, it would at least give further time to bring our matter before head-quarters at Ottawa. We thereupon decided that if this leave could be secured for Bro Swalm, that we would accept it. So with this object I personally got in touch with the proper Officials, but I soon discovered that such a request, under the existing conditions could not be granted even by any of the officers of the Baracks, asvBro Swalm is of course in the Guard House, charged with a military offence for Which he will be tried by court marshal. He is not now wearing the Uniform, and of course is not required to go into training. He is bearing up bravely under this trying experience, and gave us the promis that he would stand true to his convictions. His Father and I were both privileged to see him and have a private interview with him, in which we endeavoured to encourage him, and had prayer with him, after which we left him committed to God and the word of His grace.

I beg to advise you that I am in receipt of a reply to our "Wire," Mr Caulder stating that he had taken the matter up immediately with the Minister of Malita

I am also in receipt of your letter copy, which followed the wire yesterday .

I arrived home 10-30 last evening. Bro Swalm also returned to his home. Now we awaiting further developments, and are hopeing and praying that this may be of a favorable character. I am inclosing Copy Canadian Statutes extracts.

The Petition of The "TUNKER" Church To The Exemption Boards.

Whereas in the past history of Canada the Church known as "Tunkers" has been placed on record as a nonresistant body of Christians in the Statutes of the then, Government, of Canada and provisions made for their relief by the said Government, Sec.27, of the statute passed in the 48th year of Geo. III. 1808, and amended by an Act passed in the 50th year of the reign of Geo. III, Chap. XI, and also the present laws in force contained in the Revised Statutes of Canada, Chap. 40./ by commutation or otherwise, and whereas the principles of the said church remain unchanged, We, as loyal, law abiding citizens in every other respect, remembering past privileges and hoping for their continuance, are willing, and will gladly submit to any commutation measure that may be imposed in lieu of, and outside of, direct military service. We also further submit for your consideration the following in explanation of our posotion. It is authorized by the Executive Board of our General Conference in the United States and Canada to be presented to the Exemption Boards by our peple.

RESOLVED, That we offer as a Scriptural basis for our Nonresistant doctrine the following passages, "Love your enemies," -Matt.5:44; "Do good to them that hate you,"-Luke 6:28; "Pray for them that despite-fully use you," Luke 6:28; If my kingdom were of this world, then would my servants fight,"-John 18:36; "The weapons of our warfare are not carnal, bt but mighty through God,"- II Cor.10:4.

We respect our National Emblem, in accordance with our Faith and Practice; We are subject to the Higher powers, and obey magistrates and uncomplainingly submit ourselves to every good work for the Lord's sake, as long as it is not in violation of the fundamental teachings of Christ, as interpreted by the Tunker Church. We appreciate the degree of immunity we have enjoyed, hitherto, and for the promise of future exemption. Our opposition to war is not founded upon disloyalty to our Government, but upon the conviction that the Gospel of Christ is the Gospel of Peace. We pary for our rulers, that we may lead a quiet and peacable life, in all Godliness and honesty.— IT Tim. 2:2.

Your letter received. Am glad that you had no further troub le regarding your exemption, and glad that our brethren are not required to respond for military servée, but are considered outside of the Act.

With reference to the registration of those we are nineteen years of age for military service, the Mennonites are not under any of the present laws enacted for the recruiting of reinforcements for the army.

At the time that all citizens are required to register for the labor census, our people will register as well as others. But we bould register in such a manner that the Government will know that we are not eligible for any service in connection with direct army work or of my military nature. We should either find a place to subscribe our religion or indicate it along with the signing of the name.

Dear Brother Backer: - Greeting in the Masters name.

Your letter relative to your visit to Brother Swalm was recieved upon my return home from a vist among the Amish Brethren at Tavistock. We were glad to inform them that all indications point to the Registrars having received instructions from Head-quarters that Mennonites are not under the Act and Orders in Council ind have no duty to perform. Some have been called, but, upon presenting their credentials that they are Memonites they are exempted entirely.

The case of Brother Swalm is different. The Tunker Brethren have not benn fortunate in having their name mentioed in connection with the Act. It is very clear that the Government has been guided by theletter of the Act, and not by the spirit of it. The case of Brother was immediately telegraphed to Ottawa, and a letter followed at once expolaining the details of the case and ming a special statement of and plea for the case of the Tunker Brethren. We had stated their case previously and had made made a plea for them, but it seemed not to have been definite enough. In the the last letter it was stated as clearly as possible, and mentioed in special notes to the Frime Minister and to the President of the Privy Council, also to the Hon. U.A.Calder who has charge of our matters with the Government. I think that all of these matters with reference to Bro. Swalm and the Tunker Charch have been turned over to the Hon. Mr. Rowell. The case of the imprisonment of Bro. Swalm was at once taken up with the Minister of Militia. I think that it will have benediate attention.

There should be no fear that, in case he is sentenced, thre will follow a reprieve. But, I carmet consider that the matter will be allowed to

go asfar as Courtmartial proceedings aganst him.

I think there are others of the Tunker Bretheen in Hamilton. It is too bad about the case of Kenneth Moyer. Kenneth Stuart is in the same case.

O, what an oppressor is the god of war! May the day soon one when the Lord will one and sow men how to rule without the necessity of world revolutions. When "Nations will learn war no more."

It may being many of them to think more seriously of what is their duty to cod, and they bould be encouraged to thus confess their faith in him and stand for the principles that are planted in their hearts for bildhood. Anything that I may do to help in this cause will be cheerfully given. Cur Conference is at hand week after next. If our plea will hold good for the Mennonites, I am save that the Tanker Brethren will revieve equal, consderation and favors. May the Lord grant these earnest petition.

Mr. Weichel and myself have been endeavouring yesterday and today to have matters arranged so that your people will be exempted from the operations of the Order in Council recently passed, calling to the colors the young men from 19 to 23. In this, we think, that we have been successful. We had an interview pesterday with the Militia Council. The Minister of Militia was present and after discussing the whole situation thoroughly, it was arranged that we should secure from your Church the names of Bishops or someone in authority who could issue certificates of membership in your Church. The Officer Commanding the Military District will then be authorized to accept these certificates and allow the men off on leave.

Kindly therefore forward to me as quickly as possible the names of those to whom the Government could refer.

It does not appear desirable, at the present time, to have this information made public. We do not want it to get into the papers. We endeavored further to have this apply to the adherents of the members of your church, but up to the present time we have not been able to arrange this and I must confess that it seems doubtful at the present moment that we will be able to do so. If the Government were to do this, it would be extending to those called out under the recent Order in Council privileges beyond that contained in the original Military Service Act, as the Military Service Act granted exemption only to those who were members, in good standing of your Church.

We had before been there for that reason, perhaps for 2 month ago, but then The Grown Atty. was away to Toronto. So then the first time we were only with the Judge who shake encouragingly to us. And after asking to be naturalized, he asked if we wanted to be naturalized as Annish Mennomites, and of course Isaid yes, and thought this was possible. So then the Judge said we must see the brown Ally about it, and that then it would again eventually come before him again. So the Gesterday we were to see The Grown Ally about it, and he said we would have to be naturalized just the same as guy other ferson except that we would affirm to the oath instead of Iwearing. Otherwise it could not be made different. I will here on other side of this sheet give you a copy of the form of oath which they would want from us which I think makes no provisions for as for

Arnish Mennonites or Faith of any kind, Copy of form of Oath of allegiance. A Mornington, in the County of Perth Machinist do solemnly affirm by Almighty God that I will be faithful and bear true allegiance to still Majesty George the Fifth, his heirs and successors according to law, so help me God We asked him if we could not make it a little different so it would not interfere so much with our faith, but he said no this was the only form or way it could be done, and that if we could not make this affirmation, that we could not be come Canadian citizens and would have to remain subjects to U.S. Mow I thought and am under the impression that there would be a possibility of getting some other formst affisimation or the provisions in our case, but I do not know who to go to to get it, or how to go about it. He then Later in the day went to the court house and intended again to ask the Judge about it but could not find Him then, Now I beg you to consider our situation and kindly give it your prayerful

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thoughts. I am sorry to trouble you, but you kindly let me know how much I will one you for this, and I will gladly send you resultance for same. Let us know what you think we should do Well now about the registering of youther If 19 years :- I read the proclaimation gesterday in a paper. And as near as I understand you or any of the laws about the matter, I also think as you said the other evening, that it is best for all Memonites not to Register, Ofcourse this may drive the matter to some test cakes. To now as no one else of our congregations here have heard you say this I wish you would kindly send me a letter with this matter about registering writing so I could show it to any or all our Brethern any time neccessary. Some of four Brethren may feel afraid not to register persuade them that you think it lest also not to register, this would be good. I hope you can understand my poor dictating. I saw an item in the London Advertiger

where there are questions and answers about military ism, or proclamation about the 19 year old I man down near Walkerville & some where I think; - asked and said, he is 29 years old, and is ordained a minister, whether he would have to register or not; and a few more questions. The part of the aux that I fremember says that the Ministers are out of the act and therefore need not register. This confirmed to our idea of not registering all are not in the act.
