Your letter received yesterday evening. And you have likely received the report of the decision of the Militia Council at Ottawa which was mailed you. This information may help as regards the questions asked once ming our exemption and our need of registering. It may be that the Government will require our brethren who are noneteen to register, but will grant them exemtion on acount of their being mobers of the Mennonite Chruch. Their Church contificates should be sent with their names when the report to the Registrars, if they are required to register. I till likely receive word from Qttawa in a da or two in reply to my question about registering, and will send word at once.

In looking over the form of the affidavit which you sent I find that the conditions are better than some forms that I have seen. You are not required to promise to defend the person of the King. The cath form should be entirely stricken out. That is the phrase, "Swear by Almighty God," should be entirely stricken out and in place the Words, "firm." The last phrase, "So help me God," is not out of order. In the form which you sent you are to be faithful and bear true allegicance to the King. This is wahat we do in any country. When you have become a citizen you will be all wed the privileges of citizenship and one of the onditions is that you will be allowed to have religious freedom. The Government is grating us that now and we belive that we shall always have that privilege in Canada.

But we need to ontinue in peayer that the Lord may givens mercy under all conditons. We need to prove faithful to God and to eachoter to the best of our powers. We are glad for the privilege of helping each other, a and what I have been able to do to help you and the brehren there has been gladly and freely done. Under the blessing of the Lord it is all provided for anf I do not ask my further romaneration. Please accept it as fon the Lord and in His name.

We feel thankful for your prayers and encouragement in the work, May he ever bless you ad the brotte rhood there.

London and stating when. I replied, after thinking over matters ad after reading a letter form Hon. F. S. Scott, who has been taking charge of the Exemtplon matters for us at Ottawa. In my wire to yu I said. "Have wired Ottawa. Could do nothing by coming. Hopeful. Writing." I had sent a wire to Ottawa as follows. "Two Amish members impresoned at London. Had sent cettificates."

Mr Scott wrote me on the 20th, the letter received today, stating that the instructions which I had given about sending certificates and not reporting and not registering was alright and according to the plan wich they had made for the exemption of our brethren. You have the instructions which were maied recently. I would have been gald to ome to London ad to have given any help that could have been given, but, since I m not a military officer above the Commanding Officer there, it would have been useles for me to try to pesuade them as has been proven so often. They will not listen to arguments after they have men under arrest. It requires ordes from hisher officers, and hence I at once wired Ottawa ad the matter will be placed in the hands of the Military Authorities at Ottawa ad they will send instructions at once. I hope that before this reaches you the brethren will have been released and on their way home rejoiding in their deliwerance. I fear that others will have to pass through the experience of being subjected to arreast. These are truing times. We must nke up our minds to bear some of the afflictions that come to all men, in these days. I know that it is a hard thing to be looked upon as a prisoner, but there is no disgrace in "duffering wrongfully."

Tell the brethren that all who are of military age should have their church Certificates with them, all of the time. Perhaps on has instructions to send a list of all of your members who are aged 18 to 34 years to the Ontario Registrar at Toronto. Brother L. J. Burkholder has sent the instructions to at least some of the Ministers. The Ontario Officers wild like to have such hames sent, by the ministers of the various ongregatons so that they wild know who are our members and could grant exemption to them and detect any false representations of those who would try to get exemption by fraudd

I trust that there will be no ill feeling on account of my not coming to meet you at London. I thought this to be the wisest course to pursue. In case I should be needed, I will be glad to ome.

Two weeks ago Edwin got his call and I at once wrote the Registrar , and a reply came back almost immediately saying that call was cancelled. This order was followed till late last week two members of the M.B.C. called at registrars and were treated with sarcastic remarks and ordered to appear before Judge Winchester on Monday A.M. busines in city and I managed to get up to Hall and hear proceedings. Smythe, the military representative was almost brutal in his manners towards the young men, and argued that mennonites of Ont, did not come under the Exceptions at a Winchester was very friendly and differed with Smythe decidedly and said many complmentary things about our people. Your letter of the 80th Inst. received. Am glad to learn of the hopeful out-look for our peple and for the Tunkers brethren especially.

I wired you to-day, "Two Amish members under arrest at London. Had sent certificates." It seems that the London Tribunal had granted exemption to Mennonite brethren who had applied for exemption upon being called. These two brethren had sent in their certificates when called but did not respond in peron. Some time ago, a member of the Amish church had been a rested and taken to London ad was detained in prison there for three weeks, and then reladsed without any cettificate or other documentary evidence of his release. There seems to be some irregularity about proceedures there. I can assure you that any of the cases three who apply under the signatures of the Bishops or ministers are worthy of regonition.

The ministers of the young men in question asked me to meet them in London. I replied that I could do nothing by coming, snee I have no authority from the Government, and have noevidence save the correspondence with members of the Government on the question. The authorities at these places have notice of prodeedure from the Head-quarters at Ottawa, ad should know what course to pursue in any case. There has been no cases of my being refused at Toronto, when the proper course was taken to claim exemption. A few cases applied for exemption in person, and not with certificates, and were refused. Those who applied with certificates have so far been honored. I trust that the cases at London have been favorably endered.

There is only one case of a member of the Tunker Church that I a awre of at present that is under arrest. That is the case concerning which I wired ad later wrote to Hon J. A. Calder, the case of Ernest Swalm, at Hamilton, Scott St. Barracks. If I a not mistaken he is still detained there. Several other cases of the Tunkers were ordered to report there adw were given two weeks leave of absence. Their time is about expired and they will then be obliged to report and, unless one steps are taken to prevnt it they will also be subjected to the same treatment accorded Mr. Swalm. The boys will be obliged to refuse to put on the uniform oand to do ay military service. It grieves us that we have come in conflict with our Government in these matters. But we cannot be untrue to the profession of our faith before dur God.

Dear Sir:

After writing you on the 22ndm more information came to hand. As an evidence that some instructions are being followed by the authorities at least in Toronto, I received a letter from the Registrar that he desired the mass of male mebers of our congregations from the ages of 18 to 34 inclusive. Instructi ns were also sent out that the Church members p certificates should show how long they were members.

on the other hand, I received a letter from a party in Markham who is a personal friend of the Hon. N. W. Rowell, and who has had one correspridence with him regarding exemption, that the Toronto Tribuani has stated tht all exemptions are agin concelled and that the cases are being brought befor Chief Justice Duff for decision. I was under the impression that these matters have been settled a number of times, yet, It the Covernment chooses to rehear our ples and reverse their decisions it is their privilege to do so. At the present time there are a musber of different decisions regrading our pople. Some are exempted and hold their exempten certificates. Some are a aiting decisions and certificates of exempton. Others have been refused exemptions and some are in the guard house in bargacks with military units. It is evident that there has been no uniform treatment of our claims now, -much the same condition that existed under to the system of exemptions under the M.S.A. We are still anxiously awaiting the permanent decision of the Government regarding the non-resistant Churches. The memorial contemplated by the Non-Resistant Relief Organization in recognition of religious liberty in Camada, is now at a stand-still our pople areanxious to do something through the agency of the devermment to aid in rake work, but can hardly be expected to memorialize wht they do not enjoy.

The maes of the Tunker ministers were forwarded with the list of the Mennonite Ministers. A Conference list will bemiled you shortly. There are three Tunker boys in the Exhibition camp at Toronto, we are in the guard house or detained as prisoners owing to refusal to serve in the army. Charles Wright, Welland port Ont., Elmer L. Steckley, Gormley Ont., and John H. Heise, Richmond Hill Ont. Two more are expecting to rport at Toronto today, and they will likely be accorded the same consideration, Elmer M. Sider, Parry Station Ont., and William Charlton, Parry Station Ont., both being members for some time.

The Chief Justice has all of the Correspondence with the Government up to the time of our delegation meeting you in Ottawa. Since then we have had communication with the Prime Minister, the Hon. N. W. Rowell, the Hon. Mr. Calder and yourself. Any further evidence that we may furnish to give assistance in deciding the status of our people will be gladly given. We are almost in the same position today as were our Russian Brethren when the asked for and received religious liberty in Canada, and we feel that Canada will entinue to allow us to worship our God and foolow the Teachings of our Saviour in peace.

Scott, saying that he had received my telegram regarding the boys in the custody of Officers in London. He says t that they will undoubtedly be released in the course of a few days, ince the arrange nts which they had decided on-were not yet complete as far as notifying the Officers was soncerned. This will take a few days time, and then we will get results from the decisions of the Militia Council The whole arrangement takes considerable time.

I maied a letter to Mr. Scott, who is returning to Galt tody. He will get the letter tomorrow and will attend to the case of the Gur boys at once. We need to be patient although it is hard for the boys and for their parents to think of being separated and confined in jul for trying to serve their God with a good conscience. A unber of the Tunker brethren are at Toronto and in the same andition with not so much prospet of getting release. We are working for them and the Government will undubtedly take up the matter very soon if not already and decide on the queston of all non-resistant churches.

I understood that you will not expect to be at our Conference. I had hoped that you could come, and trust that you may yet be able to be with us.

I was sorry the I ould not give you nore satisfaction over the phone, but glad to report now since receiving the letter from Ottawa, that the outlook is better than at any the yet.

A message received today from the Tavistock district sags that thre are now four of the Amish brethren in detenmention at London, having had the uniforms forced upon them. The names are, Daniel Brennaman, William Brennaman, Henry Roth, and Simon Roth.

Sinon Roth is a citizen of Ontado, was working in Michigan ad was obliged to register thre. He later returned home and was registered here claiming his exemption as a member of the Amish Church. He lately rock ved notice to report for service in Michingan and proceeded thre with his evidences of candian citizenship to get reless from service there. He was stopped at the line and taken immediately to London and forced into uniform, Athough he has refused to take any part in drill.

We are gad for the favorable outlook and believe that everything that can be done will be done for our relacse. It means more than we can tell to feel that we are free to worship as we feel that we should in keeping the commadmants of our Lord.

There has been one decided change in the military endition up to the present time. I sent you a ciraiar letter this week. The situation os explined there. It seems that in the West the Tribunals are governed by what is done with the Ruddian brethren, and by the present decisions of the deverment we are argely held under the same conditions but a little more is required of us to get our exemption. Give all of the brethren C hurch Certificates, but be careful to put down the date of their being received as mebers. Those from the East may apply to the Church to which the belong for their certificates. They need not register at all if they are meders and hold certificates. They need not register at all if they are meders and hold certificates. There has been no decision regarding minor sons, and nothis definite for those who are men bers of memonite families and not members of the Church. The Government is considering that question at present. So, those who are not mebers must all register, and if mything is decided in their favor they will be exected.

Regarding the registering for labor, we will be obliged to register them same as the other citizens. Wis will not obligate us for military service.

Our Conference has taken no action toward recognizing the Gover ment for our exemptons. This was taken up by the non-resistant Chuches her through a Committee. The various branches of the Mennoni te Church are in this Committee and also the Tunker Church. Nothing has been done as yet since we are been waiting on the Governments decision regarding our exempts. As soon as these is decided we will be ready to take up contributions and it is very probable that the Churches in the West will have an opportunity of contributing alos.

Our Conference meets his coming week and some of the matters will be considered thre. Would be gald to have one of you with us. Pray for us during these Conference Xessions.

I have sent to him a list of the nucs of all of the boys from the Tunker Church who are now in cuap and have had the uniform forced upon them or ho are in detention. He will take up these matters at once with the authorities.

Think that your boys should reply to the Officers who have sent them their call, b letter first, and then by personal response in case they are not exempted before. Some one should go with them and see that they receive fair treatment. All of these cases should be reported to Mr. Scott o that

he will have evidence as to what is going on.

anxious to know the articulars concerning the two young men wo made apoli-

cation to unite with the Church. It would all depend on their motives in coming into the Church at the present time as to whether we would be justified, under our present arrangements with the Government, in adopting them as members. We know that the Government will recognize all nobers in good standing and will honor their claims for exemption from military service. But if any should come into the Church now, and if they had not previously been associated with the Church either as one of Mennonite parents or as regular attendants, it would do them no good to join the Church as far as claiming exemption is converned, for the Officers would not respect their claims. We could honor their sincere convictions and ask for their exemption if they are truly onverted and prove that they are sincete in their falth, but the Government would insit in their proving a longer memorship and maid question their oning to us for membeship after they had been called to the colors.

I am erry that these conditions exist. I believe that their nother was once a member of our Church. I do not know that she has wondidered herself a member at the present time. These things would be against the boys.

In case the boys are in earnest in their desire to be paptised and received, into the Church You had better attend to it for them. It would to be their privilege to stand true to the faith as far as they can. We do not wish to deny any the privilege f chri tian fellowship. They ould then report and take their stand and the onsequences ad would have to abide by the decisions of the Government. All certificates that are signed for our numbers now will have to bear the date of their baptism.

arrage matters satisfactorily as to ther faith and their desires in view of the existing conditions. Thomas Reeser in Markham paptised several of the sons of their pople in Markham. Two of them had already put on the military uniform and received permission to be baptised in civilian clothes. Obers were obliged to roort after they were baptised. None of the bys bould be as refused baptism if they are sincere, just because they are called to go to war. They need salvation then more than ever, and the hel- of God above everything clse. Dear Brother Fred: - Greeting in the name of our Master.

Your letter recived and note. The instructions which were sent to our ministers were for Mennonites. Those that you read in they papers were for bose who are called to be soldiers. We are considered ourselves as exceptions to the Act and Orders in Douncil and the Government has now considered us to be such. On account of that, we are asking our bows not to relister, since those who are not under the law are not bound by it. You may be approached by officers and asked why you are not in service. At such a time you should have with you your church combership certificate as evidence th you are not required to do military service. The Offices Commanding in all of the Military Districts will have instructions to exempt all members of the Mennghite Church. In case you are arrested for not registering, your proof that you are a member of the church will relieve you. If you register you will have the same thing to perfen, and will likely be a rested then for reporting anf not doing military service. It is as broad as long, and we prefer not to roomt for miditary service sim that act is not compatable with our faith.

We will be required to register for the enrollment of labor. This does not ixwite involve us in military service.
