It will be necessary for us to send out another letter to the Congregations and the information that we have on hand will be of some falue to encourage all to give and especially to help those who are able to give genemously of the means which they hold as servents of the Lord. Some havetaken the bonds that the Government has asked our people to take under the special provisions that the money will be used only for the purchase of food and for relief work. We are Glad that there may now be byt little occasion to use any of the money for the work of destroy ing life and we pray that peace may be esptablished and that may may do what the Lo d tells in His Word. "Seek peace and pursue it!"

AT THE GOVERNMENT HOUSE AT OTTAWA Friday the 25th day of October, 1918.

PRESENT:

HIS ENCELLERCY

THE GOVERNOR GENERAL IN COUNCIL.

WHEREAS the 7th exception under the Military Service Act 1917, describes as excepted from the pro-visions of the Act "those persons exempted from military service by the Order in Council of 13th August, 1878, and by the Order in Council of 5th December, 18984"

AND WHERRAS the former Order in Council relates to Mennenites and the latter to Doukhabours, and there are in the country, especially of the sect of Mennenites, some who did not belong to or are not descended from the immigration of 1875, and others who, although descendants of that immigration, removed to the United States, where they have lived for years;

AND WHRRMAS it is represented that some of these are now returning to Canada in order to escape military service in the United States, and claiming the banefit of the exception aforesaid;

THEREFORE, his Excellency the Covernor General in Council, on the recommendation of the Minister of Justice, and under the powers conferred by the War Measures Lot. 1914, is pleased to make the following Regulation, and the same is hereby made and enacted accordingly:-

## -REGULATION:

Monnonites in Canada who did not immigrate, or are not descendants of those who did immigrate to Canada pursuant to the arrangement evidenced by the Order in Council of August 13th 1872 or, who having so immigrated, or being descendants of the latter, have not continued without interruption to be members of the sect or denomination of Christians called Monnonites, or to reside permanently in Ganada, shall not be deemed

to be exempted from military service or within the 7th exception to the Military Service Act 1917; and in like manner Doukhebours who did not immigrate to Canada pursuant to the Order in Council of December 5th, 1918, or are not descendants of those who did so immigrate, or who being such immigrants, or their descendants, have not continued without interruption to be members of the community of Doukhabours or to reside permanently in Canada, shall not be deemed to be exempted from military service or within the 7th exception aforesaid.
