## Pre-War

- appreciated the relationship he had with his parents - there was a feeling of trust; at the same time discipline was important

- because of J. B. Martin's involvement in working with the government to establish the CO program they naturally heard more about nonresistance at the time of the War; but for him there was never any question what he would do

## War

- since they were the first group to be in a CO camp there was always a question in the boys' minds when the government would come along and put them in jail or in the army, ie. there was anxiety about the unknown
- felt that the work was insignificant, that they could have been doing something more worthwhile often much of the work they were doing could have been done more efficiently by machinery; but, having grown up on the farm he was used to hard manual labour and long hours; therefore, as far as the work was concerned they found it rather easy accepted the whole situation as something they had to do because of the stand they were taking
- his going up north had left his father alone on the farm; father felt, it was senseless to send him to do work of questionable significance when he was needed at home; yet, he was thankful that he was not going to jail or into the army; also, he did not make an appeal because he knew there were others who were in the same predicament
- after being released from Montreal River he came back to work on the farm
- was married in 1942; stayed another five years working on his father's farm
