Course Description: This course explores the vast repertoire of vocal ensemble music through an historical lens, examining the lives and music of composers who made significant contributions throughout a variety of historical and stylistic periods. The course will progress from early Medieval examples to music of the 21st Century through listening, reading and lecture. By the end of the course, students will identify musical details that define a specific period of vocal music history, discuss prominent composers and their music, and identify, by listening, music from a variety of styles and genres.
