Part of each exam will test your familiarity with the assigned music. The selections are available through the Naxos Music Library (access the course playlist through "Course reserves" on the library home page) and on CDs at the CGUC library as listed on the weekly schedule.

The class presentation will be on a composer, whose work we have not considered in class, including an overview of his or her output, and an analysis of one song. The essay will be based on the material covered in the presentation.
