Two graduate students (Maria Brisbane and Mrittika Dreesha) will be hired and share the work equally. This work includes updating, editing, and streamlining an existing e-Campus Ontario textbook and aligning it with the UW CEL version of Sociology 101.

3. Provide a one paragraph description of the OER project.

The OER project will update the assigned chapters of an existing textbook offered through e-Campus Ontario. These changes include a) Updating figures, tables and statistics with the latest material from Statistics Canada, OECD, Our World Data, and similar sources; b) Updating examples and news events that will resonate with today's students; c) Update references with more recent research where appropriate; d) Add recommended podcasts (e.g., 'Sociology Ruins Everything'), TedTalks and other relevant materials to support chapter and course content; e) Better align the content of readings with UW's CEL Soc 101 course, including editing out materials and making connections; and f) updating test bank and definitions.

The updated Canadian textbook will be housed in the **eCampusOntario Pressbook library** for other instructors to use at edit at Waterloo or across Ontario/Canada.

In addition to updating the textbook, we will update test-bank, definitions and other assessment resources that align with the updated textbook and online content (e.g., podcasts). The test bank is online and will be updated (Learn).

There is a third edition (BC e-Campus) of the Canadian version. In several places, this version does not align with the UW version of the course.

- Chapters on major social institutions such as Education were cut. This is a baffling omission.
- Figures/trends/examples are still out of date in several places (e.g., crime statistics from 2011).
- The textbook introduces too many figures/theoretical perspectives (and many are not sufficiently covered throughout the chapters but are instead scattered throughout). I have taught this course since 2013 and have come to appreciate that 'more is less'. I focus on three main theoretical buckets to provide students with a solid foundation moving into their second-year Sociology courses.
- Each chapter is too long. Having taught at UW for over 16 years, the amount of reading that is 'tolerated' has decreased significantly. The current version is 40-50 per chapter. We will cut extraneous material to both streamline and better align with the course content.

There are American versions of this textbook that have been updated and streamlined. However, these lack sufficient Canadian content (e.g., crime statistics) and their context and analysis speak to the United States. We will review and use both the 3rd edition Canadian and US versions to help us streamline content.

6. Will the creation of this OER reduce student costs for your course?

Yes. Each year, the University of Waterloo enrolls approximately 1200 Sociology 101 students, of which 750 are enrolled in the online version that assigns this textbook (Figures are based on 4-year average). Providing an up-to-date textbook for free will save our students approximately \$75,000 per year (750 students x \$100), and possibly more if other sections of 101 adopt it. However, as it stands it is not an ideal option for instructors for the reasons stated (e.g., American version; outdated materials).

I cannot keep using the current e-Campus Ontario textbook and will turn to a regular textbook (likely the Corrigall-Brown – which I have reviewed and is high quality).

Introduction to Sociology is taught across Canada. To be clear, I will only be updating the chapters that are covered at UW. After the foundations are taught, instructors, like myself, tend to draw on substantial topics that align with their research areas. I have no expertise, for example, in the sociology of religion or government. The funds do not provide sufficient resources to update all chapters.

The textbook is housed by e-Campus Ontario/Pressbooks. Future instructors can update the content on an ongoing basis.
