4 Tips for Naloxone Training

for Healthcare Providers

1 Watch Your Language



Words can be stigmatizing and can stop people who use substances from asking for help.



Remember to engage with compassion, not judgement.

Less stigmatizing:	More stigmatizing:
"Person who uses drugs"	"Addict"
"Substance use disorder"	"Dirty"
"Harmful substance use"	"Drug abuse"

2 Discuss The Good Samaritan Act

The Act protects people responding to an overdose from being charged with:1

Simple drug possession

Breaching court conditions* (where the underlying offense is simple drug possession)



*The court conditions that people are protected against include:

- Parole
- Pre-trial release
- Probation orders
- Conditional sentences

Debriefing and Preventing Distress



When someone comes for a replacement naloxone kit, ask if they'd like to share their experience administering naloxone.



This allows them the opportunity to debrief and can give you a better insight into their experience.



Remind people that stress and anxiety after a traumatic event is normal.



Refer them to a counselling service or primary care provider, if needed.



A practical tip!

Recommend the person administer naloxone into the leg rather than the arm. This can distract from the distressing signs and symptoms of the overdose.

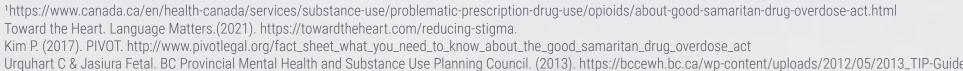
