"How effective is naloxone at preventing overdose deaths?"

One study showed 96 of 100 people survive an overdose when they are given naloxone. More overdoses are treated when more naloxone is handed out and more people are trained.

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"Can naloxone be administered to anyone?"

Yes! Naloxone can be administered to all ages,³ including those who are pregnant, who have heart or kidney disease, or who have any other health condition. Naloxone is very safe.

"What if my kit is expired or exposed to high or low temperatures?"

Store kits at room temperature and replace every 2 years. In an emergency, use the kit you have! Studies have shown that naloxone remains stable even after exposure to extreme temperatures⁴ and after a kit expires.

"Naloxone won't increase opioid use, right?"

No. Studies have shown that there is no increase in drug misuse when naloxone kits are handed out.⁵ Naloxone is a lot like epinephrine (EpiPen®) for allergies: both help in an emergency.

"How well does naloxone work for overdoses caused by fentanyl?"

Naloxone works well for overdoses caused by fentanyl. Overdoses involving fentanyl may or often need more than 2 doses of naloxone. If an overdose is suspected, administer a dose of naloxone every 2-3 minutes until the person responds. Giving multiple doses is OK!
