Some of the videos on this account are directly related to the course. If I can find a way to show internet content in the assigned classroom I will show some of the Youtube videos in class. You will be responsible only for the videos that are shown in class, whether they come from Youtube or other sources.

Course Description:

In this course we will consider classic and contemporary personality theories, and evaluate their usefulness in understanding human behaviour. We will consider recent empirical research, and we will also consider methods used in personality assessment. It is hoped that this course will be meaningful to you, and will lead you to a deeper intellectual and personal understanding of the complexity of human behaviour.

UW ACE, online notes, and class attendance:

I post lecture notes online so you will be able to listen and think about the material during the class without excessive writing. You will need to take some additional notes of your own in class. Although the lecture notes are detailed, students who come to class typically receive higher grades than those who do not.

Videos & DVDs shown in class

There will be questions on the tests and the exam about videos and DVDs shown in class. The videos and DVDs come from several sources. Some of the videos are owned by UW, and you may arrange for a private screening of those videos so long as the videos are not out on loan. Some videos are on loan from other universities, and are not available for direct use by students. Other videos come from my own private collection. Due to previous losses, I no longer lend my own videos

Methods of Evaluation:

1. Midterm test 30% October 16

(On material from weeks 1-5)

2. Final exam 40% TBS December 6-20.

(Includes material from October 16 after test 1, up to and including the last class on November 27)

3. Required essay Due October 30 OR November 26.

If you hand in your essay in class on October 30 (by 9:00 PM at the latest), I will return it to you with a grade in class on November 13. This will give you time to decide if you want to write the optional essay.

4. Optional essay Due November 26

If you write the optional essay, the essay component of your grade will still be given a weighting of 30%. The essay that receives the better grade will be worth 2/3 of the essay grade, (20 out of 30 points), and the other essay will receive a grade worth 1/3 of the essay component of the final grade (10/30 points).

Test and exam material: The midterm and final exam will consist of multiple choice & short answer questions. The midterm and the exam cover all assigned readings and material covered in class for the time periods specified above. Videos are considered to be part of the class, and there will be questions about the videos on the test and exam. Unfortunately, I cannot arrange alternate screening times for videos, and I do not lend my own videos.

Travel plans during the exam period:

Note that student travel plans are not acceptable grounds for granting an alternative final examination time. Students are not to schedule trips for the exam period until after the exam schedule is available and they are able to plan any trips to avoid time conflicts.
