Course Description. This course is designed to help you develop key skills used by researchers in developmental psychology and in psychology more broadly. Many of these skills are also useful in non-academic contexts. The course is designed to be driven by your own interests and you will gain experience asking research questions, designing studies, conducting literature searches, collecting and interpreting data, and presenting findings.

How to Succeed. Attend class, be engaged, and complete the assignments.

Readings. Some optional reading and links will be uploaded to LEARN.

ASSIGNMENTS & OTHER REQUIREMENTS

- **A1. Self-assessment & skills background.** Due Sep 10th at 5pm (2%, all-or-none).
- **A2. Observation in ECEC & Reflection paper.** Observe children's free play in the ECEC (Sep 16-18) and then write a reflection paper (400 words maximum). The paper is due Sep 19 (4%).
- **A3. Methods & Results presentation.** Present the *Methods* and *Results* from one experiment on Sep 24 & 26 (10%). 4 minutes per presentation + extra time for questions.
- **A4. Observational study & poster presentation** (15%). Collect observational data. Then create and present a poster.
 - 1. Observe children at the ECEC (Oct 2-4; Oct7-11).
 - 2. Create a poster (upload to LEARN by Oct 22, beginning of class)
 - 3. Poster sessions, Oct 22 & 24.
- **A5. Article presentation** (15%). Present a research article in a 15 minute presentation. You need to reserve an article by Oct 22. To do so, check <u>here</u> to see if someone else has already chosen it. If it's still free, check with me to see it's suitable. If it is, use this <u>form</u> to reserve it.
- **A6. Final project** (44% overall). Design, conduct, and write-up an experiment.
 - 1. Conduct experiment on members of class (Nov 12 & 14) and fake data from kids.
 - 2. First draft of paper due Nov 26 by midnight.
 - 3. Reviews of 2 rough drafts, due Nov 28 by 7pm. Max 2 pages/review (4%, i.e. 2% each).
 - 4. Final draft. Max pages = 10; worth 40%; due Dec 10 by 5pm.

Participation (10%). Includes attendance + contributions to class discussions (e.g., after presentations).

COMPLETING & SUBMITTING ASSIGNMENTS

- -Upload written assignments as .doc, .docx, or .rtf files. Use 12pt Times New Roman font, double spaced, with all margins set at 1 inch (2.54 cm). Page/word limits *do not* include titles or title pages, abstracts, figures, tables, or reference sections.
- -Many assignments require you to use APA (American Psychological Association) format as described in the 6th edition of the APA Publication Manual (2010). A "mini-manual" has been uploaded to LEARN
- -Unless otherwise specified, files should be uploaded to LEARN before class on the date due. Please double-check that your file is uploaded correctly!
- -Save your work often, e-mail it to yourself as an attachment as a backup, and please don't leave it until the night before or the due date. Broken printers, hard-drives failures, computer crashes are not excuses.
- -Unless you have an appropriate doctor's note, a death in your family (or equally severe situation), extensions for late assignments will not be given. Instead, late assignments will receive a maximum grade of 50%.
