About the Course Author

Course Author — Doris Jakobsh

Background

Doris R. Jakobsh is a Professor in the Department of Religious Studies at the University of Waterloo. She received her academic training at the University of Waterloo, Harvard University, and the University of British Columbia. Professor Jakobsh has written and edited numerous books, including the textbook utilized in this course. She has also published individual articles and chapters in journals and books. Her main area of specialization focuses on gender construction within the Sikh tradition. Professor Jakobsh has lived and traveled extensively in Asia, primarily in India.



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Course Description

This course is an introduction to Asian Religions, formerly called 'Eastern Religions'. Beginning with an introduction to the study of religion, the course then turns to important terms, major developments, rituals, and central religious themes within Hinduism, Buddhism, Sikhism, Jainism, Confucianism, Taoism, and Shinto. A Canadian and North American focus will also be included for each tradition.
