Course Objectives:

The most basic goal of this course is to acquire a working proficiency in reading adapted or simple texts in Ancient Greek, with reference to dictionaries and grammar handbooks. To this end, we will finish the textbook *Athenaze*. We will also read selections from the *New Testament Greek Reader* and selections from a variety of genres written in Attic Greek. Sight reading of Ancient Greek will be undertaken in this course.

By the end of this course, you will have learned the basics of Ancient Greek morphology, syntax, and phonetics. You will be prepared to read significantly more complex Ancient Greek works. If time permits, you will have read brief selections of unadapted ancient Greek epic, tragedy, lyric poetry, forensic oratory, and historical narrative. If we are swamped with time, you will have been given a very brief introduction to the basics of an *apparatus criticus* and the process of establishing a Greek text from papyrus, parchment, or paper manuscripts. Finally, you will be learning the basics of close reading, both of a culture and its literary output.
