Course Description and Objectives

Course Description

- This course looks at organizational strategy through the 'lens' of sustainability. It explores how corporations (and other types of organizations) are re-aligning and in some cases re-inventing their business strategies to move toward more sustainable business models. This includes initiatives undertaken within the firm, as well as initiatives pursued outside the firm (such as through partnerships). Several frameworks are offered for assessing the degree to which principles of sustainability are embraced within an organization's strategies. In addition, tools for formulating and implementing a sustainability strategic plan are presented. Case studies draw from different sectors and also different organizational types.
- This is one of four core courses in the MEB program.

Objectives

By the successful end of this course you should be able to:

- · Understand the basic concepts of strategic management
- Know environmental scanning and strategy formulation procedures
- Understand strategy implementation and control procedures
- · Identify and discuss appropriate business-level sustainability strategies
- Determine application of the course teachings to case studies

<u>Dr. Amelia Clarke</u> has been working on environment and sustainability issues since 1989, including as President of Sierra Club Canada (2003-2006). She is now a tenured faculty member in the School of Environment, Enterprise and Development (<u>SEED</u>) at the University of Waterloo. As of May 2018, she is also the Associate Dean Research for the Faculty of Environment at the University of Waterloo. Her main research focuses are related to implementing the <u>Sustainable Development Goals</u>. She leads a team project



on <u>implementing sustainable community plans</u> (including community climate action plans), and co-leads a second project on <u>youth & innovation</u>. Dr. Clarke's work has been published in journal articles, book chapters and practitioner reports.

Dr. Clarke holds a PhD in Management (Strategy) from McGill University. She has also served on numerous advisory committees, including the Canadian Advisory Committee to the U.N. Habitat's World Urban Forum III; and the Canadian delegation during the U.N. World Summit on Sustainable Development negotiations. From 2009 – 2018 she served as the first director of the Master of Environment and Business (MEB) program at the University of Waterloo, so she oversaw the creation of this award-winning online degree. In 1996, she founded the Sierra Youth Coalition (SYC), and is proud of having launched SYC's sustainable campus program which helped create significant change on more than 80 Canadian campuses. She is also proud of her efforts to help influence the creation of 10 new protected areas in New Brunswick.

Teaching Assistant (TA) — Ying Zhou

Ying Zhou is a PhD candidate in Sustainability Management in the Faculty of Environment's School of Environment, Enterprise, and Development (SEED) and an Energy Council of Canada (ECC) energy policy research fellow. She holds an MES in Sustainability Management from the University of Waterloo and a BSc Honours in Environmental Science from Queen's University. Her doctoral research aims to identify local decarbonization pathways and governance structures for municipalities in the Canadian context. Specifically, she will conduct analyses on the optimal pathways, strategies, actors, and governance arrangements for stimulating community-wide changes and achieving the 2050 Paris Agreement targets.

Ying's previous research focused on the potential use of market-based instruments (MBIs) for implementing sustainable community plans (SCPs). It



was built on existing literature and two pilot communities to develop a

Sustainability Alignment Methodology (SAM). SAM is a tool that considers the market-based instruments under municipal jurisdiction to help implement the environmental goals in the SCPs. Her study contributed to the understanding of the applicability of MBIs on the local level and also equipped municipal governments with a useful tool for the implementation of their sustainable community plans.
