# ENBUS 204 Industrial Ecology FALL 2018

## **COURSE DESCRIPTION**

Industrial ecology is the systematic analysis of global, regional and local material and energy flows that are associated with products, processes, industrial sectors, and economies. Included in these analyses are energy consumption, non-renewable and renewable materials consumption, air pollutant emissions, waterborne pollutant effluents and solid waste generation associated with human activities. These analyses are the foundation of industrial ecology, which seeks to design and manage products and services that meet human needs in a more sustainable manner. This course will familiarize you with the vocabulary and analysis techniques used to assess and improve product systems.

## **LEARNING OUTCOMES**

By the end of this course, you should:

Be able to assess/evaluate environmental impacts of a product system

- Understand and quantify material and energy flows
- Calculate performance metrics
- Critique / evaluate claims
- Locate and select appropriate data to construct flow diagrams for simple product system
- Interpret flow diagrams

Acquire skills necessary for professional competence

- Demonstrate facility with disciplinary vocabulary
- Demonstrate facility with data and their manipulation

### READINGS

All readings will be assigned during the term through LEARN. These readings come from a combination of peer-reviewed academic literature, books, and 'grey' (not peer-reviewed) literature and websites. Complete citations or web links will be provided for all readings. Searching for online journals to obtain readings for the lecture will be also be demonstrated.

# **COURSE COMPONENTS & EVALUATION**

There will be three quizzes during the term on the readings and lectures, which will count towards 30% of the course grade. Quizzes will take place at the beginning of class, will be designed to take no longer than 45 minutes to complete, and will focus on material (readings & class) that has been covered since the previous quiz. The midterm exam will be given during class time (on October, 2018) and will cover all material up to that point (class presentations, readings, quizzes 1 and 2). The venue for the midterm exam will be announced later. The final exam is comprehensive (i.e. covers material from the entire course) and integrative (i.e. asks you to put together ideas covered

separately during the term). The date, time, and location of the final exam will be determined by the registrar later in the fall term, so it is recommended that you DO NOT make holidays travel arrangements until you have consulted the examination schedule, as you are expected to be present to write the exam.
