She worked for five years in consulting, in work related to LCA of agriculture, and renewable energy, and social and environmental responsibility in metal supply chains. Her areas of research include: environmental modeling and management, including LCA; bioenergy and biofuels; sustainable agriculture and food systems; social and environmental responsibility in supply chains. She is currently an Assistant Professor in SEED at the University of Waterloo.



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Course Description and Objectives

Course Description

Life Cycle Assessment (LCA) is one of many environmental management tools that examines and assesses environmental impacts associated with products and systems. LCA is a "cradle-to-grave" approach, as it considers the environmental inputs (materials and energy) and outputs (emissions) related to a product or service, from the time the raw materials are extracted to make product, to its final disposal. It has become an important tool used by businesses and governments to improve the environmental performance of products and services, and can be used to support decisions on product development, eco-labelling, policy and planning, and technology assessment, to name a few.

This course introduces the concepts of life cycle assessment (LCA) based on the ISO standards (ISO 14040/14044/14048) and provides an understanding of the uses of LCA, and the limitations and appropriate applications of this methodology. Although the main focus of the course is to learn the mechanics of conducting an LCA, the course also addresses the organizational, management, and policy aspects of LCA. Students will be evaluated on the understanding and application of LCA concepts for conducting a review of LCA studies as well as a LCA modeling project.

Learning Objectives

By the successful end of this course you should be able to

1. identify and explain the 4 phases of LCA according to ISO 14040/14044 LCA standards;
2. describe and explain general challenges in the application of each phase of the LCA framework and critically evaluate the strengths and limitations of the LCA methodology;
3. critically evaluate LCA studies for adherence to ISO standards and best practices;
4. plan and develop a report describing the LCA procedure for analyzing a product or service;
5. implement the LCA procedure for analyzing impacts of a product or service;
6. articulate the relationship between the product life cycle and resource use and environmental impacts;
7. critically evaluate how LCA and Life Cycle Management (LCM) can help society achieve sustainability; and
8. demonstrate timely and effective participation in virtual teamwork, peer-learning, and online activities.
