Cara Eastcott, Independent Multidisciplinary Creative

Cara has curated, produced, and programmed over a hundred projects in music, dance, visual arts, theatre and disability arts over the last 15 years. She has held multiple leadership positions at Tangled Art + Disability; a Deaf and disability art gallery and organization. In 2020, she curated *Legends Are the Rivers That Take Us Home* (Thames Art Gallery, 2020). The exhibit was influenced by the work of Black-Canadian filmmakers, Claire Preto and Roger McTair and the residents of North Buxton, the Underground Railroad borderland of Southwestern Ontario. In her words: *"I resist the notion of art as an elitist inaccessible, unrelatable private luxury. How do we bring the experience of arts and culture back into our public daily lives in a way that is normalized and has a lasting impact?"*
