Rationale for New Course ⓘ

The new 400-level course and the reduction of the number of 400-level courses required for the 4-year plans are intended to both solve a persistent structural problem with the Philosophy program, and to add pedagogical value for Philosophy Majors.

Structural problem: The current 4-year degree requirements impose a structural limit on the number of students who can fulfill the requirements each year, and as a result we do not currently have the capacity for all of our Majors to satisfy the program requirements. The introduction of a new required course is part of the solution to this structural problem. The other part of the solution is the reduction of the number of 400-level courses students need to take.

Background: Philosophy currently offers four 400-level courses per year: two in Fall and two in Winter. All four are run as 'held with' 600-level graduate courses. Majors in the 4-year plans currently need to take at least three of these courses. Because these courses are run as 'held with', there are typically around 10 seats available for undergraduate students, which means a total capacity of 40 seats per year. As a result, no more than 13 students can complete their 400-level requirements in any given year. There are typically more than 13 students in 4A/B in a given year, meaning not everyone has been able to satisfy their requirements. We have been using ad hoc strategies to help these students, but these strategies are limited and not sustainable, and a structural solution is needed.

Changes: We are aiming to address this structural problem through two changes. On the 'demand' side, our proposal is to reduce the number of 400-level courses required for a 4-year degree from three to two, which reduces the demand on the existing four 400-level courses. On the 'supply' side, our proposal is to add a new 400-level course that will be required for all 4-year Majors. In combination, these changes significantly increase the overall capacity of the 4-year program.

There are two reasons that the proposed course needs to be required: one structural, one pedagogical. Structurally, making the course required helps ensure that it will consistently draw enough students to run. There is a risk that adding a fifth 400-level course that was not required would fail to draw 18 students and so be at risk of being cancelled. Pedagogically, making the class required allows the Department to reinforce research and communication skills. An observed phenomena in 400-level seminars 'held with' 600-level seminars is that many undergraduate students take on the role of observer, with graduate students then dominating classroom discussions. An undergraduate-only required course centres undergraduate students in discussion and will give them more space to develop research and communication skills at a proficient level. This maps onto both the department's plan-level learning outcomes, and the university-level learning outcomes.
