Rationale for Change

This set of changes responds to the Gender and Social Justice (GSJ) Program's last external review. The proposed changes address the following actionable recommendations:

- Retire GSJ101 and GSJ102 and replace both with a new required course (GSJ100).
- Streamline required courses to ensure sufficient enrolments
- Update the Gender and Social Justice Program to align with cutting-edge pedagogy, theory, and practice in the field.

Additional benefits of these changes include:

- Providing students with a strong foundation in the theoretical aspects of gender and social justice, namely feminist theory and gender theory.
- Offering students increased flexibility to develop areas of specialization in gender studies.
- Improving the student experience by fostering a sense of community.
- Removing barriers and making it easier for students to enter progress through the various plans. Many students join GSJ later in their tenure at Waterloo, and the removal of prerequisites and reduction in the number of required courses makes this transition easier for students.

The GSJ committee conducted a systematic analysis of the Gender Studies Programs from 15 peer programs at Canadian universities. Although there is significant variation among programs, the proposed changes align with those of strong peer institutions.

Focus groups provided the opportunity for current GSJ students to discuss their experiences and to express their ideas about the program to the GSJ program committee.

The Gender and Social Justice Program Committee, comprising faculty members with expertise in gender studies whose home disciplines include Black Studies, Communication Studies, English, History, Philosophy, and Recreation and Leisure Studies, unanimously approved this set of changes.

HIST269: Indigenous Histories in Canada is part of a sequence of History courses at the 250-, 260- and 270-levels that are designed to give History majors and non-majors the experience of studying a survey course, broadly conceived, that introduces them to history that is primarily regional or geographic in focus. All similar survey courses in History except for HIST269 have a DIS component. A DIS component provides students with a vital opportunity to meet, either with the instructor or a teaching assistant, to talk about themes in the course. Discussions are intended to provide students with a smaller group setting where they can ask questions about weekly lecture content, learn what is expected

of them for their assignments and readings in greater detail with the opportunity to ask questions, and interact with their peers outside of the more formal lecture format. The absence of a DIS component for HIST269 is due to an unfortunate oversight when the course was originally created. To make HIST269 more consistent with other survey courses offered by the Department of History, adding a DIS component is vital, and will successfully complement course content. Any instructor who teaches HIST269 in the future will then have the option to integrate discussions into the weekly class schedule in order provide a richer, more fulfilling experience for students, so it is not merely a lecture-driven course.

This course examines the history of Africa in the 20th century, a time of tremendous change on the continent. Looking at broader trends as well as examining specific states, students will learn about the impact of colonialism, movements for independence and liberation, and the dynamics of postcolonial states and societies. Students will learn through lectures, analyzing primary and secondary sources, engaging in discussions, and independent research.

Description

This course examines the history of Africa in the 20th century, a time of tremendous upheaval and change on the continent. In the first half of the course, students will learn about the introduction and expansion of colonial rule, considering how the colonial state was imagined, enacted, experienced, and overthrown. The second half of the course focuses on the postcolonial period, illuminating how states and citizens navigated the challenges and opportunities that emerged following independence. Within each part of the course, students will learn about a range of case studies from multiple regions of the continent. Overall, students will engage with the key debates, themes, and methods that have shaped the study of twentieth-century Africa, focusing in particular on questions of identity, state-building, resistance, gender, violence, and memory.

By introducing students to diverse performance traditions and their social contexts, the course teaches critical thinking about historical narratives rather than accepting them at face value. Through examination of case studies from ancient performances to contemporary events, students develop the ability to recognize historical influences in current practice, enabling them to build upon traditions rather than unintentionally reinventing them. THPERF271 is a plan requirement for all majors and will support the program's goal of developing thoughtful artists who understand their work within broader historical conversations and can articulate the significance of their artistic choices within historical frameworks—a crucial skill for emerging theatre practitioners. We have been working on this new proposed structure for the past year or so. In our earliest

discussions, two goals emerged: 1) More clarity as to the logic of the course groupings in the calendar, which bled together in terms of level and topic area; 2) more requirements in terms of how students progress through the program to provide a more robust shared experience and knowledge base. We spent much time discussing this second point; we agreed that the flexibility of the program has been a draw and that many of our students have appreciated this flexibility. On the other hand, in the current plan it is possible to more or less avoid courses in history/theory/context—aside from 101—and, on the other end, it is also possible to minimize the more practice-based courses. The new proposed plan was made with the intention that flexibility be preserved while also insisting on a balance between theory/history/context courses. The new required courses, including Key Concepts in Media and Culture, Performance Studies, and Public Communication, build a conceptual toolbox meant for artists and designers “working towards futures defined by more just forms of relationality among humans.” This new plan retains the current PLOs and, we feel, is better designed to ensure students take classes to meet those PLOs.

The proposed changes to the Theatre and Performance Program curriculum respond strategically to enrolment declines within humanities disciplines by establishing three distinct specializations—Performance and Production, Production and Design, and Theatre and Performance Studies—that create transparent career pathways while preserving our program's foundational commitment to critical inquiry and liberal arts methodologies. These clearly articulated tracks enable prospective students to envision concrete professional trajectories and acquire focused practical skills that directly address industry demands, while maintaining the interdisciplinary flexibility and critical engagement that distinguishes liberal arts theatre education from conservatory models.

The redesign addresses mandated larger class sizes and significant budget pressures through strategic structural innovations. Our new fundamentals course efficiently delivers foundational knowledge to larger cohorts, while the tiered production structure and consolidated production participation sections—integrating dramaturgy with production and performance—preserve experiential learning quality despite resource constraints. Strategic production scaling ensures project complexity matches student readiness at each level, and the integration of guest artists strengthens industry connections while enriching student learning. Additionally, the reduction of credits in the capstone course THPERF400 allows students greater flexibility to pursue specialized electives or additional production experience in their final year.

These modifications strategically leverage existing faculty expertise in performance, design, technical production, and theatre studies, allowing faculty to engage more deeply with their areas of specialization rather than teaching broadly across disparate subjects. This alignment creates more sustainable long-term workloads while enabling faculty to develop signature courses that reflect their research and creative practice, directly benefiting students through access to instruction grounded in professional expertise.

The three-specialization model addresses critical gaps in both the institutional landscape and the professional theatre industry: Performance and Production prepares versatile artists capable of both creating and performing work, responding to industry demand for multi-skilled practitioners; Production and Design addresses the shortage of trained designers and technical leaders in Canada; and Theatre and Performance Studies serves students pursuing graduate study, arts administration, dramaturgy, or applied theatre work—career paths increasingly vital to the cultural sector.

By requiring a minimum of three production practicum credits in third and fourth year, we reinforce our program's defining characteristic—centering embodied learning through sustained production engagement—while directly addressing persistent student feedback regarding insufficient practical experience. This structure ensures all graduates possess demonstrated competency in collaborative theatrical creation and positions production as the site where technical skills, critical theory, and professional practice meet. Students develop the practical abilities, collaborative capacities, and problem-solving skills that transfer effectively to diverse career contexts, preparing them not only for traditional theatre roles but also for emerging opportunities in experiential design, event production, arts administration, community-engaged practice and education.

Our proposed changes incorporate critical theory and research practices throughout all four years, producing graduates who possess both technical proficiency and the analytical capacity to articulate the social, ethical, and political dimensions of their creative choices. The addition of THPERF271 (Performance History; previously THPERF371) as a required course ensures all students develop the historical literacy and awareness essential for informed artistic practice. In an industry increasingly attentive to questions of representation, accessibility, and cultural responsibility, our program will help graduates enter the field equipped with practical skills alongside the critical frameworks necessary to interrogate and transform theatre-making practices. These modifications create a sustainable educational model that honors our program's production-centered history while positioning graduates to meet—and shape—the evolving demands of contemporary theatre and performance practice.

Consultations (Departmental)

The program revision process prioritized extensive student engagement to ensure proposed changes aligned with student needs and perspectives. Initial insights were gathered through biannual townhall events held in previous years, which provided foundational student input that informed the development of the current proposal. Building on this foundation, ongoing collaboration with the

Theatre Student Union (TSU) included two dedicated focus sessions held this Spring specifically to discuss and gather feedback on the proposed curricular changes.

1. The original goal of the minor was to give students having trouble maintaining their standing in the Economics major an additional option. That's why ECON 211 and 221 is part of the minor. However, it is rare that an econ major student switches to the Theory minor, as students either consider theory unattractive or too challenging.
2. The demand for this Minor comes largely from outside the faculty, mostly from Math. The first change is to allow ECON 211 to be replaced by an equivalent calculus course, and to allow this course to count in the required eight courses. ECON 211 is mostly a math course, so it is unfair to require students with another math course to take an additional Econ elective while not requiring the same for those with ECON 211.
3. We also want to remove the stats requirement. The majority, if not all, students who might be interested in the economic theory minor are in majors that already require a stats course.
4. Since we now consider ECON 100 as equivalent to having both 101 and 102, we want to approve ECON 100 as a replacement for both ECON 101 and 102. Students who have taken ECON 100 will be required to take an additional course from the list of electives.

5. The current minor is too restrictive in terms of required courses. There are eight required courses, leaving no room for other pertinent courses. We want to reduce the list of required courses and offer the possibility of choosing theory courses from a longer list of electives.

Consultations (Departmental)

- We consulted with Engineering (Jason Grove <jason.grove@uwaterloo.ca>, Derek Rayside <drayside@uwaterloo.ca> and Ben Chen <zhikang.chen@uwaterloo.ca>) about including several engineering courses in the list. They showed interest in the minor, so we decided to include equivalent courses that they offer, to simplify the completion of the minor for their students. For this particular minor, only MSE263 was added to the list. It is equivalent to ECON101.
