Course Description and Learning Outcomes

Course Description

Social change is the most inevitable process in human history, and yet it is seemingly the most elusive or challenging for those seeking social justice and liberation. Theories of how to turn desires for social justice into tangible actions abound in the humanities and social sciences, and various historical and contemporary social movements have provided us with useful knowledge and resources for the continuing project of justice and social change. This course uses experiential learning to help students explore the possibility of turning social justice goals into action through a case study approach that builds students' skillsets in research, communication, collaboration, and decision-making. While focusing on social action, we will simultaneously explore methodological approaches to gathering, assessing, and presenting information and ideas. Drawing on the work of social theorists, activists, artists, filmmakers, writers, poets, and pop icons, this course will engage the question: How can everyday people work together to effect social change?

Learning Outcomes

As an ARTS 140 student, you will:

1. Access information and practice navigating library resources, including indexes and databases.
2. Recognize, define, and reflect on the meaning of quantitative and qualitative data.
3. Practice writing and speaking through communication assignments that will build your skills and confidence.
4. Collaborate with your classmates and provide, incorporate, and reflect on feedback.
5. Demonstrate an ability to reflect on how information, analysis, and communication lead to knowledge.
6. Assess, examine, and evaluate the uses of information, including distinguishing between facts and values.

Social Justice, and Social Action; SDS 411R – Decolonization and Social Action, and SDS 441R – Popular Culture in the Radical Imagination.

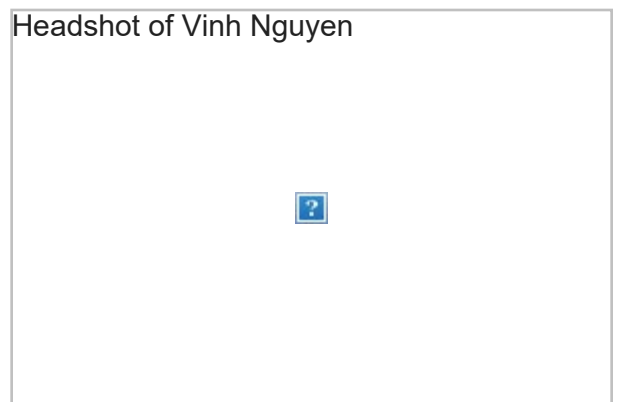

My latest book *Unsettling the Commons: Social Movements Within, Against, and Beyond Settler Colonialism* investigates the contradictions, experiences, and limitations of activists in North America in their engagement of solidarity with Indigenous struggles for land and life.

Late Policy

Weekly Portfolio Activities

Weekly deadlines have been provided to help you stay on track with course work. It is very important that you do your best to keep up with submitting activities according to the time set out on the Course Schedule. However, these deadlines are **not considered "firm."** Rather, they are "soft" deadlines that are designed to help you manage your time effectively. **The Weekly Activity dropboxes will actually remain open until the final deadline indicated on the [Course Schedule](#).** This allows you the flexibility to submit past the soft deadline if you need to, without having to seek permission from your instructor.

Bear in mind, however, that persistent, undocumented lateness in submitting your activities may reflect negatively on your portfolio grades.

Discussions

Deadlines for posting and replying to discussions have been provided to facilitate meaningful discourse; i.e., to enable you to exchange ideas with your peers, construct and confirm understanding, and collaborate with each other. As such, **these deadlines are considered "firm"** – i.e., **it is crucial that you meet the deadlines both for posting and replying as outlined in the [Course Schedule](#)**. These deadlines help us to avoid the scenario where everyone posts just before the deadline, and true discourse becomes impossible.

Assignments (Keyword Assignment, (Pod)Cast Assignment)

All assignments are expected to be submitted on time, and **deadlines for these are considered "firm."** If you encounter circumstances that you feel may cause you to be late in submitting any particular assignment you should contact your instructor immediately, explain the circumstances, and we may negotiate an extension. To do so, you must be in contact with your instructor **at least 48 hours prior to the deadline** to request an extension. Late assignments will be accepted up to a week beyond the deadline at a penalty of 2% per day. After the fifth day, late assignments will not be accepted for any reason except those outlined in the University of Waterloo calendar (e.g., medical or family emergencies, or some other such event) and will receive a grade of 0. If an extension is granted, you are expected to submit your assignment at the agreed-upon time and date, with the appropriate documentation.
