Course Description

Calendar Description for LS 273 / SDS 210R:

This course examines children's rights from a moral and comparative legal perspective. Students explore the welfare and developmental interests of children; the corresponding duties of parents, custodians, educators, and social workers; and the nature and scope of public educational authority in the common law jurisdictions of Canada.

In keeping with the Socratic tradition, this course will be taught as a series of interactive lecture sessions. Each week will include at least one documentary excerpt to facilitate class discussion and individual student reflection.

Learning Outcomes

By the end of this course students should be able to critically examine and reflect upon:

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| the moral and legal status of children; |
| the welfare and developmental interests of children; |
| the educational responsibilities of parents and the state; |

the nature of custody and purposes of custodial authority;
the impact of the American concept of 'parental rights';
the parens patriae doctrine as applied in Canada;
the UNCRC as interpreted and applied in Canada; and
a range of topical issues in children's rights.
