Year 1: SOC 101, BA breadth requirements

<u>Year 2:</u> SOC 202, SOC 221, SOC 280, SOC additional courses at 200-level, BA breadth requirements (if not already completed)

Year 3: SOC 302, SOC 322, SOC additional courses at 300-level, unique SOC major courses

<u>Year 4:</u> SOC 4XX theory seminar, SOC additional courses at 400-level, unique SOC major courses (if not already completed)
