

## **Course Sequencing**

You may take courses in your academic plans (majors, minors), BA breadth requirement courses, or electives that can be counted towards your BA degree requirements.

Year 1: SOC 101, BA breadth requirements

Year 2: SOC 202, SOC 221, SOC additional courses at 200-level, BA breadth requirements (if not already completed)

Year 3: SOC 280 or SOC 322, SOC additional courses at 300-level, unique SOC major courses
