You may take courses in your academic plans (majors, minors), BA breadth requirement courses, or electives that can be counted towards your BA degree requirements.

Year 1: SOC 101, LS 101, BA breadth requirements

Year 2: SOC 202, SOC/LS 221, SOC/LS 280, SOC and LS additional courses at 200-level, BA breadth requirements (if not already completed)

Year 3: LS 300/SOC 370, SOC 302, SOC/LS 322, SOC and LS additional courses at 300-level, unique SOC major courses, unique LS major courses

Year 4: SOC 4XX theory seminar, SOC and LS additional courses at 400-level, unique SOC major courses (if not already completed), and unique LS major courses (if not already completed)
