# **DEI 625:** Business Innovation and Impact

### COURSE DESCRIPTION AND LEARNING OUTCOMES

# **Course Description**

DEI 625 is an online research, reading, discussion and seminar course designed to prepare MDEI students to contribute where "innovation" is a key success factor. More than understanding innovation and finding solutions, the course focuses on developing an understanding of the impact innovation has on the pillars of sustainability and the connections between the underlying challenges.

The course is oriented by a perspective that, given today's rate of change, fluency with the key topics of the innovation discourse, an understanding of the typical barriers to innovation, and a basic toolkit of skills to overcome these barriers will become a valuable, albeit highly conceptual, career asset. While innovation is not inclusive to one discipline, the course aims to an understanding and use of innovation tools and techniques for different settings.

# **Learning Outcomes**

The learning outcomes of this course are broad, but will revolve around the understanding of innovation and building on being more literate about innovation, understanding the need for it, and what needs to be taken into consideration when innovating:

- Become more literate about innovation
- Understand the need for innovation
- Be able to describe innovation
- Demonstrate a feeling for opportunities & threats
- Use your creativity
- Develop practice-relevant skills
- Contribute to the course
- Follow things you're interested in

Upon completion of this course, students should be able to:

- Draw upon a vocabulary of innovation and business theories in professional and academic discussions, solve problems related to business strategy, innovation and technology;
- Conceptualize the relationship between innovation, creativity, business models, strategy and technology, that are relevant in contemporary business and institutional practice;
- Anticipate constraints, barriers and ethical implications to innovation; and,
- Draw upon an inventory of heuristics and techniques to facilitate innovation.
