# DEI 627: Business Planning and Feasibility

#### COURSE DESCRIPTION AND LEARNING OUTCOMES

# **Course Description**

This is an online special topics, discussion, and seminar course designed to prepare MDEI students to contribute where "innovation" is a key success factor. More than understanding innovation and finding solutions, the course focuses on developing an understanding of how the worlds of business and design are connected.

The course revolves around group work but will feature individual assignments as well to make your grade a little less dependent on your peers. As an individual, you will learn about idea generation and assessment, project structures, business needs, business plans and, most important, the steps of a feasibility analysis. As a group, you will familiarize yourselves with a UX case study and conduct a feasibility analysis.

We will focus a lot on learning by doing. There won't be too much input every week, so getting through the content will be relatively quick. However, you may have to read more on certain concepts. While you should know how to work with the information you are given, you should also learn how and where to find the right information if there are gaps in your knowledge.

# **Learning Outcomes**

The objectives for this course are to learn about: the idea generation process as well as tools and the process of how to assess ideas; business needs in a project and what a business plan looks like; the steps of a feasibility analysis and how to conduct one using UX case studies. Students will also work individually or in teams simultaneously, bringing the works of both together as needed. Upon completion of this course, students should be able to:

- Create a business plan
- Conduct a feasibility analysis of a project
- Explain the connection between UX/UI and business through a case study approach
