#### Syllabus GBDA 103: User Experience Design

#### **Course Description:**

In this course, students will learn the basic principles and practices of user experience design, usability testing, information architecture and user research. Not only will students develop a conceptual understanding of user-centered design (UCD), but they will also learn to research user behavior and strategize to provide a foundational understanding of the interdisciplinary field of user experience design.

# **Objectives:**

By the end of the course, students will be able to:

- 1. Apply the basic principles of User Centered Design (UCD)
- 2. Demonstrate how the role of the user, their behaviors, perceptions, attitude and expectations affect their interaction with digital devices, software and applications
- 3. Use different prototyping methods, design principles and wireframing tools
- 4. Plan, implement and interpret User Experience Research (UXR) using a variety of different methodologies
- 5. Demonstrate a basic understanding of the Web Content Accessibility Guidelines (WCAG) set by the World Wide Web Consortium (W3C)
- 6. Identify and use basic strategies for getting stakeholder buy-in for user experience research and make a business case for UX
