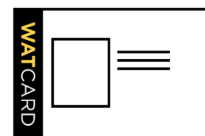


So you're trying to help students navigate the Library?

1 Library locations & hours

2 Study Spaces

1 Omni, the library's catalogue

The backbone of the Library, Omni allows students to search our collection of books, ebooks and journals. Waterloo is a partner institution with 18 of Ontario's university libraries, which gives students access to millions of books from across the province. 1 Assignment Planner




Breaks down research and writing projects into manageable steps based on due dates, providing a road map and workback schedule. Assignment types included are annotated bibliography, lab reports, research essays, STEM poster presentation, policy briefs, literature review, critical reflection, article review, and math assignment
